6. Special Education Presentation

STRIVE Conference, Mat Burkhart, Principal, J.A. McWilliam Public School

The STRIVE conference is an annual student symposium for grade 8 students who are formally identified with a learning disability. Students and families were invited to spend the day learning about learning disabilities as well as learning about self-advocacy. The goal for students is to learn more about themselves and hear from other students about their experiences in school and to hear about their challenges and successes. Parents will have the opportunity to participate in sessions geared to their learning about learning disabilities and how to support their child as they transition to secondary school.

Special Education Plan 2022 – Community Feedback

Feedback from the first four standards were discussed showing feedback received from the survey. It was noted that some of the comments were very general and very brief. M. Wilcox noted that we would use the input for possible changes to the Plan for 2023-24 when it was reviewed over the winter and into the spring of 2023. It was noted that parent concerns/feedback would normally be followed-up with the child's school through the normal communication protocol. External psychological assessments were brought up and it was shared by Dr. Crundwell that they were provided to schools and once parent consent was received.
